The heavenly host praised God before the shepherds as they proclaimed, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men" (Luke 2:14).

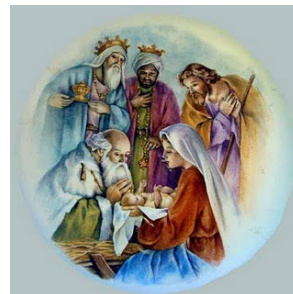

It is marvelous accomplishment of God on behalf of a person who momentarily believes in Christ for salvation from sin. By trusting themselves to the reconciling work of Christ alone, people pass from God's wrath to God's blessing and from spiritual death to spiritual life.

I pray that all of you have the true spirit of Christmas and heart of true worship of Jesus Christ as the shepherds and wise men did.

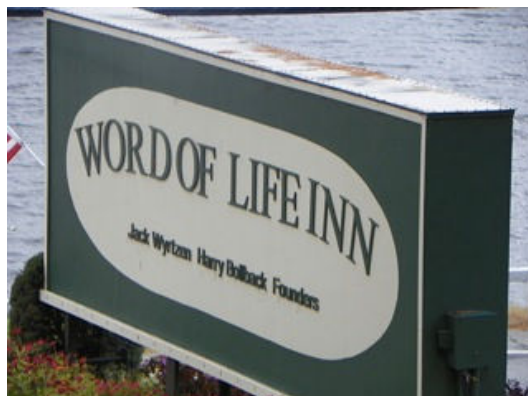
Deaf Ladies Retreat

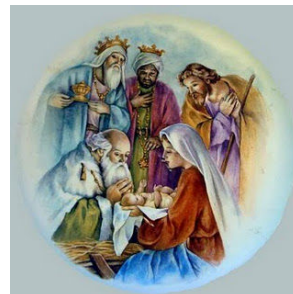

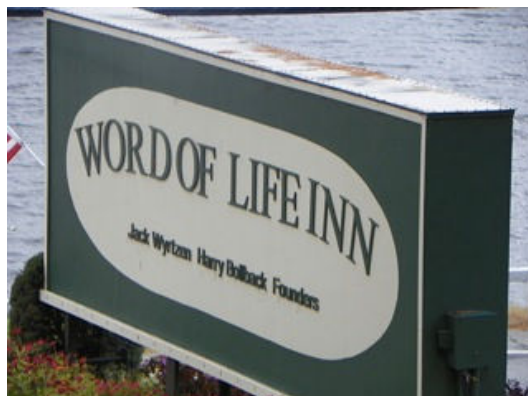
