WHO IS SQUANTO?

Squanto

Squanto helped the starved Pilgrim colonists to recover from their first bad winter by teaching them the maize cultivation. He taught them use fish to fertilize crops. Also he taught them how to catch the menhaden. He was there when the Pilgrims had the first Thanksgiving. On January 1, 1585, Squanto was born near Plymouth. He was captured by Captain George Waymouth and brought to England. Fernando Gorges taught him English and trained him to be an interpreter. Squanto returned to North America and was captured again by Englishman Thomas Hunt and was sold as a slave in Spain. A monk taught him about the Christian faith. Then he returned to North America. On March 22, 1621, Samoset introduced Squanto to the Plymouth colonists. The Pilgrim colonists were surprised that he spoke English very well and used him as their interpreter and guide. Squanto helped the Pilgrims by talking with Chief Massasoit about peace with the Pilgrims. Peace lasted for 53 years. Squanto became sick and died on November 30, 1622.

The story of Squanto reminds us of Joseph in Genesis being sold as a slave. He was selected by the Pharaoh to prepare food for seven years before drought appeared and lasted for seven years. He saved his family and the Egyptians from been starving according to God's purpose.
